The theme for this year is a continuation of the one on integration of physical and mental health from last year, with a specific focus on the relationship of mental health with chronic physical illnesses.

On the occasion of the World Mental Health Day, the World Health Organisation is launching its Mental Health Gap Intervention Guide (mhGAP-IG) this year on 7th of October, which will be the inception of the implementation phase as well.
